CHARTER MEMBERSHIP EXCEEDS EXPECTATIONS; 61 CHARTER CHAPTERS INSTALLED

ixty-one charter chapters of Sigma Beta
Delta have been installed in as many
institutions of higher education during this
charter year of the honor society. This
number more than doubles the goal of
30 chapters originally anticipated, and
reflects business schools' enthusiasm
for recognizing their best students with membership
in a national honor society.

Sigma Beta Delta has been established to honor students who have attained superior records in business, management, and administration programs in schools and colleges with regional accreditation.

In the U.S., over 900 institutions of higher education with regional accreditation are lacking a national honor society in business. This represents over 60 percent of the senior institutions offering bachelors, masters and/or doctoral degrees in business as listed in the HEGIS (Higher Education General Information Survey) Report.

Sigma Beta Delta's charter membership represents a wide spectrum of academic institutions, including both public and private, small and large, religious and secular.

Seven chapters have been listed as founding chapters of Sigma Beta Delta: Belmont University (TN), Morehouse College (GA), Southern University (LA), North Carolina State University (NC), Houston Baptist University (TX), Saint Leo College (FL), and McKendree College (IL).

The two-fold purpose of Sigma Beta Delta is to encourage and recognize scholarship and achievement among students of business, management and administration, and to encourage and promote personal and professional improvement and a life distinguished by honorable service to humankind. Scholars ranking in the top 20% of their class are eligible for membership in the society.

There are two other national honor societies recognizing academic achievement in business and management: Beta Gamma Sigma (BGS) chapters currently serve institutions with accreditation by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB); and Delta Mu Delta (DMD) serves those institutions accredited by the Association of Collegiate Business Schools and Programs (ACBSP). With the establishment of Sigma Beta Delta, all other institutions with regional accreditation will have the opportunity to honor those students achieving academic excellence in business.

Sigma Beta Delta traces its beginnings to June 19, 1986, where, at a BGS Long-Range Planning Committee meeting in Williamsburg, Virginia, Dr. James Bearden, then Vice President/President-Elect of BGS, and currently Sigma Beta Delta's founding President, urged BGS to thoroughly examine its relationships with AACSB non-accredited schools.

In subsequent discussions, BGS leaders acknowledged that the business honor society is a vital participant and positive force in higher education, and should be available to all regionally accredited schools. The culmination of the discussions was a decision by the BGS Board of Governors to establish Sigma Beta Delta.

The creation of Sigma Beta Delta follows a 200year tradition of honoring scholastic achievement in higher education, beginning with the establishment of Phi Beta Kappa in Williamsburg, Virginia in 1776.

Children have been present to see honor conferred on their parents, grandmothers looked on with pride to see grandchildren publicly recognized as individuals of achievement, and parents see a harvest of pride at the end of a long growing season as their children are presented the insignia and certificate of Sigma Beta Delta. 

Meaning of Sigma Beta Delta

(from the Induction Ritual)

The principles of Sigma Beta Delta are represented by three Greek words, the initials of which form the name of our society: SIGMA BETA DELTA.

Sigma is the initial letter of the Greek word $\Sigma O\Phi IA$ which means wisdom. Wisdom is knowledge gained over time, analyzed and used with discernment. Wisdom is not merely information, but allows one to acknowledge information, consider its validity and relevance, and then incorporate into one's own life what is appropriate....Wisdom is knowledge applied.

Beta is the initial letter of the Greek word BEBAIO∑ which signifies honor. Honor is a personal quality of the highest value. Honorable persons are held in esteem, considered to be trustworthy, and admired by others because they live a life that is worthy of such recognition. Honorable persons have chosen to live a life that is bounded by integrity and ethical decision-making so that they may be free of the tyranny of dishonor. Honorable persons respect others and are willing to provide leadership to the benefit of humankind.

Delta is the initial letter of the Greek word $\Delta I\Omega K\Omega$ which signifies the pursuit of meaningful aspirations. To aspire to worthy goals sets apart persons of accomplishment and those who merely mark time with their lives. Persons of wisdom and honor must aspire to a course to achieve their objectives, for goals without action are no more fulfilling than action without goals. To aspire toward the fulfillment of one's goals to serve humankind and develop personally and professionally will lead to a life of meaning and satisfaction.
