



On October 26, 2019, Dr. James H. Bearden and Dr. Donald H. Driemeier were the first recipients of induction into Sigma Beta Delta's Hall of Fame. These two exemplery individuals were recognized for their many years of service and dedication to Sigma Beta Delta and for their dedication to the collegiate honor society community.

Considered two of SBD's founding fathers, Don and Jim saw the need to enrich the collegiate educational communitty by creating an honor society for business programs that have regional accreditation but do not have ACBSP or AACSB specialized accreditation. The gap that existed encompassed 1,000 programs within the United States, hundreds of institutions internationally, and tens of thousands of students at the time and for many generations to come. "Benjamin Franklin" was the first guest to speak at Sigma Beta Delta's 25th Anniversary Celebration and Quadrennial Meeting. A fitting way to open the society's celebration of "Looking Back While Moving Forward." The joyous occasion took place in Philadelphia, PA on October 24-27, 2019. Philadelphia, rich in American history and rich in history of Founding Fathers, was chosen as the quintessential location to celebrate Sigma Beta Delta's history and founding members while looking toward the future.

Ben Franklin has been dubbed, The Patron Saint of Advertising, for the skill and wit he used to sell products and ideas. Ben wasted no time selling to the audience of Sigma Beta Delta members, chapter advisors, Board members, and event presenters. Ben shrewdly engaged the audience with cheers of huzzah to past, huzzah to the present, and huzzah to the future. After glasses were raised in rejoice, Ben delighted the



audience with stories of his glories past and the country's glorious past. Four audience members were called upon to take part in a rollicking trivia game show. One of the audience participants, an SBD Board member, was chosen as a little bit of payback for his razzing treatment of Mr. Franklin. All were thoroughly entertained and the pride of the game show participants were only slightly tarnished. Ben was able to stick around for the paparazzi to snap plenty of pics with his fans before leaving the audience with words of wisdom fitfully setting a tone of resolute action for the events that followed.



Mary Hallward-Driemeier opened the first session of the day as the Keynote Speaker. Mary is a Senior Economic Advisor in the Finance, Competitiveness & Innovation (FCI) Global Practice at the World Bank Group, overseeing the analytical agenda on issues of private sector development, technology and productivity. Her speech entitled, "Increasing Automation and the Future of Growth," presented a global view of manufacturing focusing on implications for developing countries as well as Europe and the United States as important global value chains. Mary presented research that shows increased adoption of industrial automation, advanced robotics, smart factories, the internet of things, and 3D printing are nsforming the manufacturing process. Companies once influenced by the prospect of inexpensive labor costs are beginning to favor locations that can better take advantage of new technologies.



The topic landscape shifted for the next speaker, Owen Rankin, to marketing and branding. Owen is President and Founder of Over the Horizon Strategies. Owen's speech entitled, "Leadership Lessons from the J&J Beijing Olympic Sponsorship," shared insights and stories from his time leading the marketing, branding, and corporate reputation campaign for Johnson & Johnson at the 2008 Beijing Summer Olympics. Owen presented details about his unique experience embracing cultural differences, geographic and time separation, and differing corporate and local goals to pull off a very successful campaign. His presentation served as a master class in how to determine corporate and community needs, taking on challenges as opportunities, increasing sales, all while positively impacting humankind.





Douglas Hallward-Driemeier was the final speaker of the day. Doug leads the Appellate and Supreme Court practice for the global law firm Ropes & Gray. The title of his speech was "Practice with Purpose – Putting Your Values to Work in Your Professional Life." Doug is the son of SBD's founding father, Donald H. Driemeier. He graciously joined in celebrating the Society's anniversary to honor his father who had passed in the spring. Doug talked about his passion for equality in the workplace for all employees. The firm he works for donates tens of thousands of hours of probono work for human rights initiatives throughout the world. Doug also challenged the students in attendance to consider the quality of life their carrer path will provide them and to also consider the purpose their career will serve to the betterment of humankind. All attendees were left with a sense of obligation to "Practice with Purpose" and to challenge others to do the same.

The other events included a panel discussion on business that included all of the speakers, including JoAnne Brandes. JoAnne is the founder and co-president of the Center for Leadership and Excellence. She has had a long an exemplery career as a corporate lawyer. She persented her persoanl and professional leadership expereiences she gained from her father and her business career. JoAnne shared quotes from letters her father wrote to her throughout her life. The personal stories truly inspired everyone in attendance.

The event's activities wrapped up with a formal banquet that included the innaugural inductions into Sigma Beta Delta's Hall of Fame and a inspiring and rousing closing speech from Dr. William J. Kehoe. Dr. Kehoe fired up the attendees and challenged them to follow in SBD's motto of living a life of Wisdom, Honor, and Aspirations. A final cheer of huzzah and a fond wish of not farewell but to fare forward.
