igma Beta Delta was proud to report that 61 chapters were installed during its charter period. That number has grown by 25 to a grand total of 86 chapters across the United States.

As the chapters have grown, so have the benefits of membership with the designation of a fellowship program.

Four \$500 fellowships will be awarded for the 1997-98 school year. All fellows must be Sigma Beta Delta members and either undergraduate or graduate students enrolled in business programs during the year of the award.

Each chapter is encouraged to nominate one person for the fellowships. The four award recipients will be selected by the Executive Committee. More information about the nomination process will be mailed to faculty advisors during the 1996-97 school

Dr. Clifford Eubanks Praises Business Honor Societies

f you want to know about national business honor societies a good resource is Dr. Clifford Eubanks. He has the distinction of being a member of all three national honor societies which recognize academic achievement in business and management.

Dr. Eubanks, better known as Cliff back then, got his first introduction to a business society as a graduate student at the University of Arkansas in the early '60s, when he was inducted into Beta Gamma Sigma. He went on to earn both an MBA and his Ph.D. at that institution.

As an assistant professor of management at Kansas State University in 1966, Cliff was instrumental in bringing a Delta Mu Delta chapter to the Manhattan campus. Belmont University in Tennessee - where he is a management professor - became the

first chapter of Sigma Beta Delta in March of 1994. Cliff presently serves on the Sigma Beta Delta Executive Council and served on the Beta Gamma Sigma Board of Directors from 1986-90.

"It's been a great thrill to experience the very rapid rate of growth students at Belmont University. of Sigma Beta Delta," he says. "In less than 25 months, we now have 86 chapters in 33 states. It makes me feel very proud that we invested the hours to make Sigma Beta Delta a reality."

According to Cliff, national honor societies play an important role on campus. "I think we need to provide recognition for students who excel. It's nice to be recognized by your peers and by others, such as future employers, as earning that distinction. And it's a permanent part of their (the students')

records." As a member of SBD's Executive Council, Cliff has had the pleasure of attending several induction ceremonies. "It's just a wonderful occasion."



years he has taught business and management at the University level. After teaching at Kansas State for two years, he became the chairman of the management department at Murray State University in Kentucky for four years. Cliff moved to Alabama to accept the deanship of the School of Business at Troy State University. From there he accepted the deanship at the University of Central Florida, where he stayed for 14 years.

In 1989, Cliff became the chairman of Winter Park Hospital and its holding company — Park Health Corporation. Although he always viewed this professional step as temporary, he remembers his years at the hospital during a time of great change in the health care industry as being one of the best experiences of his career. "We made a lot of changes."

But, as challenging and exciting as being chairman was, Cliffwas drawn back into education. "My love for the students and academe led me to conclude I wanted to be in higher education," Cliff says. So in 1993 he accepted the deanship at Belmont University which is four hours east of his hometown, Paragould, Arkansas. Last summer he left the deanship and became a professor of management. This move allows him more time to devote to his strategic planning consultant business. By blending the two careers, Cliff is able to put the corporate strategies he teaches into practice and bring what he learns from the businesses back to his students.

"I get great satisfaction working with students who are about to enter their careers and, in my consulting business, I work with corporate CEO's at the heights of their careers."

MEANING OF Sigma Beta Delta

(from the Induction Ritual) The principles of Sigma Beta Delta are represented by three Greek words, the initials of which form the name of our society: SIGMA BETA DELTA.

Sigma is the initial letter of the Greek word ΣΟØIA which means wisdom. Wisdom is knowledge gained over time, analyzed and used with discernment. Wisdom is not merely information, but allows one to acknowledge information, consider its validity and relevance, and then incorporate into one's own life what is appropriate... Wisdom is knowledge applied.

Beta is the initial letter of the Greek word BEBAIO∑ which signifies honor. Honor is a personal quality of the highest value. Honorable persons are held in esteem, considered to be trustworthy, and admired by others because they live a life that is worthy of such recognition. Honorable persons have chosen to live a life that is bounded by integrity and ethical decision-making so that they may be free of the tyranny of dishonor. Honorable persons respect others and are willing to provide leadership to the benefit of humankind.

Delta is the initial letter of the Greek word $\Delta I\Omega K\Omega$ which signifies the pursuit of meaningful aspirations. To aspire to worthy goals sets apart persons of accomplishment and those who merely mark time with their lives. Persons of wisdom and honor must aspire to a course to achieve their objectives, for goals without action are no more fulfilling than action without goals. To aspire toward the fulfillment of one's goals to serve humankind and develop personally and professionally will lead to a life of meaning and satisfaction.
